Virtual Youth Summit Hosted By Palm Beach County Organizations Promotes ‘Building a Better You, Future and Community’

This spring, community partners in Palm Beach County came together to plan the Palm Beach County Youth Summit, a momentous event that gathers more than 600 local middle and high school students, community groups, volunteers, and law enforcement for a day of empowerment, education, and great entertainment.

In Palm Beach County, thousands of youth face opportunity gaps that prevent them from reaching their potential. These gaps not only affect the individual young people and their families, but also prevent them from fully contributing to the community and the economy, thus impacting us all.

Collaboration and partnership were the keys to this year’s first virtual presentation of the Youth Summit. Since its founding in 2011, Marcia Bahia from Palm Beach Sheriff’s office, and collaboration with the Urban League, recognized the need to offer young people conference-styled workshops and conversations to promote leadership skills and hands-on learning. In 2011, the event hosted more than 100 teens, and through assistance and continued collaboration, the event grew in attendance to more than 600 teens coming together at Palm Beach Lakes High School. COVID-19 changed the dynamics of how the event could operate, so this year planners Myhosi Ashton, Marcia Bahia, Rex Barnes, Jaime-Lee Bradshaw, Shirlon St Amour, Susan Foley, Andrea Hurtado, Lilian Kanna, Alexa Lee, Breanna Lewis, Ana Martinez, Corey Murphy, Will Romelus, came together to think big: “how could we provide an interactive virtual platform to model the need in the current time and era of a pandemic?”

On June 27, 2022, the Youth Summit went live with its three-day event to provide open access to interested local middle and high school-aged youth with a unique opportunity to explore and address areas of concern impacting them through interactive virtual workshops and activities. These included insightful presentations and life-changing information on the topics of career and education planning, healthy relationships and preventative care, crime and bullying prevention, mental health, substance

abuse prevention, health issues, leadership, social justice, financial literacy and any current topics of concern. In total, the Summit received more than 1,700 views on [YouTube](#).

Hands-on activities, exciting topics for discussion, prizes, and community service hours were offered to attendees. Parents had the opportunity to join ‘Time for Your Teen’, a workshop to influence parent-child communication and promote healthy development.

“All the speakers brought their best game to educate and inform youth of next best steps. The moderators kept the momentum going with help from Digital Vibez. The highlight of the event was the youth involved! That is the key – peer to peer connection.” – Susan Foley, Project Specialist, Palm Beach County Behavioral Health Coalition.

Day one, themed Building a Better You, was hosted by Prime Time Palm Beach County Middle School Specialist Anton Spalding. Anton facilitated Q&A sessions that included questions from attendees to Palm Beach County Health Coalition, Digital Vibez, and Palm Beach County Victim Services.

Day two was themed Building a Better Future, moderated by Susan Foley, Project Specialist, Palm Beach County Behavioral Health Coalition. The day opened with a Prime Time’s Teen Advisory Council video called Youth Panel Discussion that was moderated by Josiah Manners, a member of Palm Beach County Youth Services Department Future Leaders United for Change Countywide Youth Council.

Day three, themed Building a Better Community, was hosted by Prime Time Palm Beach County Quality Advisor Andrea Hurtado. Andrea facilitated Q&A sessions that included questions from attendees, Palm Beach County Behavior Health Coalition Teen Coalition in Action, Palm Beach County Sheriff’s Office, Community Partners of South Florida, and Compass Community Center. Palm Beach County ‘Gets Its Green On’ For Mental Health



Birth to 22: United for Brighter Futures and the Becoming a Trauma Sensitive Community Action Team celebrated the seventh annual “Get Your Green On (GYGO)” campaign and invited Palm Beach County to wear green on May 19, 2022 in solidarity. The GYGO Team, Palm Beach County Channel 20 TV, and the Birth to

22 Becoming a Trauma-Sensitive Community Action Team recorded a feature on Channel 20’s [“County Connection”](#) to highlight the Get Your Green On Campaign.

On April 29, 2022, the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners Vice Mayor, Gregg Weiss, proclaimed May as Mental Health and Trauma Informed Care Month in Palm Beach County. Several local municipalities followed throughout the month, including Belle Glade, Boca Raton, Boynton Beach, Delray Beach, Lake Park, Lake Worth Beach, Pahokee, Palm Beach Gardens, South Bay, and Wellington.

Local community partners hosted an array of events, including: “We Will Rise Above” concert by the Young Singers of the Palm Beaches; Family Mental Health and Wellness

Festival presented by the West Palm Beach Mental Health Committee; Boynton Beach Mental Health Month Book Club; “Remembering and Healing Together” hosted by the Boynton Beach Mental Health Committee & City of Boynton Beach; Butterfly Release and City of Boca Raton Mental Health Month Proclamation, Youth Services Department Mental Health Lunch & Learns, Faulk Center for Counseling; MHA Mind & Body Connection 5K; Question, Persuade, Refer suicide prevention training, and much more!

On May 19, Get Your Green On day, thousands of residents wearing green posted pictures across social media. This year, the Get Your Green On website was revamped to include events and information, mental health resources, an engagement toolkit, and campaign materials to share across social media. Committee members participated in several outreach events including radio and television interviews to spread the importance of mental health awareness and trauma-informed care. Well done to the Birth to 22 and GYGO subcommittee for the exceptional planning and to everyone in Palm Beach County for honoring your behavioral health and wellness. Culture of Wellness Exercises

In May/June, the PBC Culture of Wellness Team (PBC Youth Services, Palm Health Foundation, PBC Community Services, Children's Services Council, and BeWellPBC) hosted more than 60 community and systems leaders through an immersive experience and a series of activities to consider how these partners, individually and collectively, could design pathways to a vibrant community and thriving families. The 2-part series invited leaders to recognize the impact of systems on families and ignite thinking and action around transforming services and support for residents in Palm Beach County.

The immersive experience grew from the original Phase I project with ReThink Health, an initiative of Rippel Foundation, where Palm Beach County was chosen as one of two sites to pilot their Portfolio Design for Healthier Regions project, a Robert Wood Johnson Foundation-funded effort. Specifically, ReThink Health was drawn to the origin story of the BeWellPBC initiative, including the shared interests among the county's funders to support such an approach to

transform Behavioral health. They were interested in local experiences using the tools developed to design and manage portfolios as stewards of shared resources. A core team – the PBC Culture of Wellness Team – was formed to work with ReThink Health to think intentionally about growing civic muscle and belonging in Palm Beach County. Two years later, the team has come to believe that the approach and the tools are especially useful when considering resource allocations. The stewardship mindset is particularly useful in Palm Beach County's pursuit of better health for all.

With the recent 2-part series, the PBC Culture of Wellness Team has moved into the facilitator role as they launch Phase II of the ReThink Health project and utilize the approach and tools to invite additional local stakeholders to reimagine the behavioral health system and investments. Continuing into the fall, leaders from across the county will participate in learning labs and insight to action meetings to work together in the spirit of shared stewardship. ReThink Health will continue as consultant support to the project.

Super Summer Spelling Bee 2022



Palm Beach County Youth Services Department hosted its eighth annual Super Summer Spelling Bee on July 14. The competition was held virtually with 172 campers from 33 Summer Camp Scholarship Program sites participating.

The spelling bee is for students enrolled in the Summer Camp Scholarship Program's participating camps and provides academic activities to encourage the spirit of learning while preventing summer slide. Using Kahoot!, a virtual learning-based platform, campers' spelling skills were tested in a fun and interactive way allowing spellers to compete with campers throughout the county.

"The Super Summer Spelling Bee provides an exciting opportunity for our camps to participate in a county-wide activity together and win prizes. The competitive spirit is

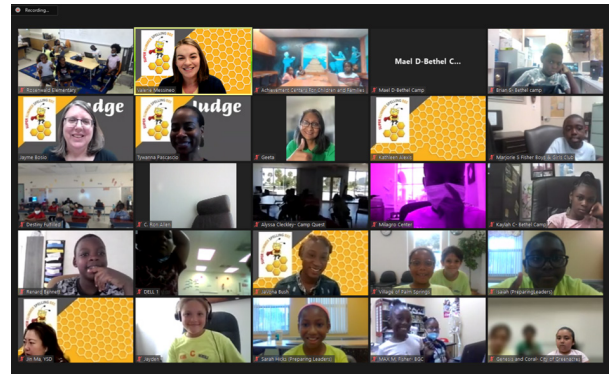

‘Juneteenth Think Tank’ Hosted by Delray Residents

On June 18, 2022, the Delray Beach Community hosted the Juneteenth Think Tank event held at Pompey Park in Delray Beach. Part of this event was The Soil Collection Ceremony for Sam Nelson. Sam Nelson is one of at least 319 African American victims of racial terror lynching killed by white mobs in Florida between 1877 and 1950, and one of at least two African American victims of racial terror lynching killed in Palm Beach County during this period.

This ceremony was an acknowledgement of the lynching of Sam Nelson in 1926 in Delray Beach. This ceremony was also a part of the process of acquiring a larger memorial, a part of a reconciliation process, and part of the Juneteenth celebration. Digital Vibez Dances Their Way Into 11th Annual KidsFit Jamathon for Palm Beach County Campers

[Digital Vibez](#), a Black-led Palm Beach County nonprofit that empowers youth in diverse and underserved communities through dance, fitness, technology, and the arts, hosted thousands of Palm Beach County summer camp children in partnership with Prime Time Palm Beach County and Palm Beach County Youth Services, at their 11th Annual KidsFit Jamathon at the South Florida Fairgrounds on July 28, 2022, from 9:30.a.m. – 3:30 p.m.

The nonprofit hosted two sessions that day, offering a professional concert atmosphere with music, dance performances, amazing sound, stage lighting, inflatables, and local celebrity dance judges, including Reggie Dee from X102.3 and Montana Globerman from The Montana Method. Kids had an opportunity to participate in the acclaimed dance contest, with the winning program receiving \$750. In addition to the exceptional concert, there was also a Kidz Zone full of games, obstacle courses, bounce houses, music, fitness activities, and healthy snacks – encouraging youth to continue adopting healthy behaviors to help combat childhood obesity. The event was streamed online for kids unable to travel that day.

This innovative, interactive, concert-like experience has quickly become one of the largest summer camp events that motivates and inspires kids to stay fit, dance, and live healthy lives. Last year, the nonprofit attracted the attention of renowned singer, Natasha Bedingfield, after a dance to the popular “Unwritten” remix that was created by Digital Vibez’s dance instructor and Tik-Toker Rony Boyy went viral

with more than 42 million views.

“KidsFit Jamathon, along with each program and event we create, is designed to promote dynamic physical activity for children and their families through a diverse genre of dance, music, technology, and healthy tips,” said Wil Romelus, founder and executive director of Digital Vibez. “We help those who are unable to enroll their children in activities that promote physical health while doing everything possible to encourage kids to keep moving all while having fun.”

The nonprofit continues to forge ahead with the expansion of its new Digital Vibez Studio, where youth and teens can come and get creative using state-of-the-art equipment.

Revised SEL Framework



This summer, The School District of Palm Beach County revised their SEL Framework to align with the new expectations for required Health Instruction as outlined in Florida Statute 1003.42(n). The SEL Framework consists of the Social and Emotional Health Competencies: Self-Awareness, Self-Management, Responsible Decision-Making, Resiliency, Relationship Skills, and Conflict Resolution, and Understanding and Respecting Others' Viewpoints and Backgrounds (Social Awareness). These competencies represent skills that build confidence,

support mental and emotional health, and enable youth and adults to overcome challenges. In addition, the SEL Themes that fall under each competency help young people work towards achieving the outcomes of the Florida Character Education Standards.

Students develop these competencies in many ways as they move through their classroom(s), school, out-of-school time (after school), home, and community. When opportunities for SEL across all of these contexts are consistent, students are more likely to internalize these core Social and Emotional Health Competencies. The SEL Guide seeks to coordinate SEL across all these settings by providing possible weekly SEL Themes that can be taught, discussed, and applied throughout the school year.

SEL Summer Institute



On August 1, 2022, Prime Time Palm Beach County and the School District of Palm Beach County (SDPBC) hosted its 3rd annual SEL Summer Institute.

This year's theme was Refresh, Reconnect and Reengage. National presenters included Dr. Douglas Fisher and Monica Marie Jones. Breakout sessions were facilitated by staff from CASEL, Prime Time, and the SDPBC. There were more than 400 participants in attendance.



Secretary Harris Meets with Foster Families Throughout the State



This week, Department of Children and Families (DCF) Secretary Shevaun Harris toured the state to meet with foster families, caregivers, and adoptive parents to learn about their experiences and how recent initiatives support their families. The Secretary hosted roundtable conversations with a small group of foster families throughout the state. The Secretary met with families who

have directly benefited from the additional supports being offered to foster parents including the expansion of Hope Florida – A Pathway to Prosperity, a cost of living increase included in the Freedom First Budget, and the \$450 one-time payments for foster parents.

“We are so appreciative of the foster families who have made the decision to welcome children into their home and offer them a safe and loving place to live,” said Secretary Harris. “With Governor and First Lady DeSantis’ leadership, we have been able to invest so much in our system and have increased the resources available to the families we serve. Through these roundtable discussions, we have been able to have honest and productive conversations about how we can continue to support and improve our system. We’ve heard from so many parents about how helpful the \$450 checks from Governor DeSantis have been, and we will continue working to make sure these families know how much we appreciate them.”

“I think the checks just serve as an added help and support in these crazy times of rising prices,” Harris said.

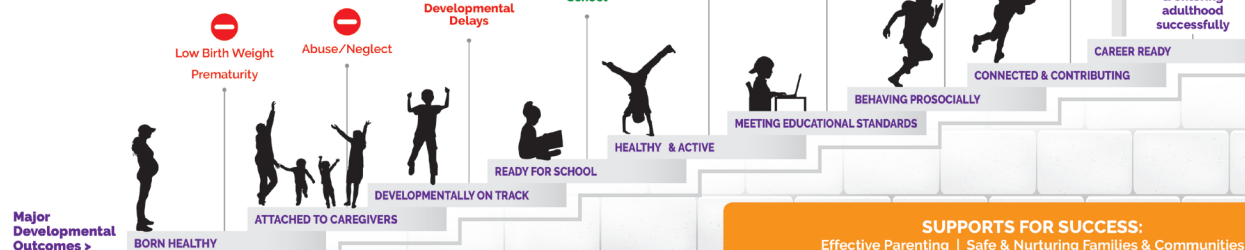

Steps to Success

The Steps to Success represent 6 domains of child and youth development – physical health, behavioral health, academic readiness, social/emotional well-being, career readiness and connection to community and society. These steps represent key markers of success that allows us to access developmental outcomes. As children and youth make their way up these stairs, we are able to track their progress or lack thereof. The indicators, or measures, for these different areas are shown above the stair steps in the green text (for things we are trying to promote) and orange text (for things we are trying to prevent). Understanding what this data looks like for different subpopulations within Palm Beach County is also essential. In order to achieve those outcomes, children and youth need key supports along the way, through a combination of effective parenting and safe and nurturing families and communities. A sample of possible measures are listed below.

Steps to Success & Supports for Success
